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View from the fringe: The sale of a portion of hydro one

Selling assets to pay for needs is a reasonable choice if the needs are worthwhile, but that is a judgment call. The imminent sale of a portion of Hydro One could be a tacit admission by the Ontario government that this sale would be less damaging to the government's fiscal position, than raising taxes or borrowing more money. That judgment must have been part of the calculus that prompted this decision in the first place. The sale certainly does not presage a new direction toward smaller, more limited government. The money accrued from this sale is to be used to pay down debt and advance questionable aspects of the government agenda.

Ordinarily Ontario Libertarians would support downsizing government by the divestment of components of a monopoly such as the electricity cartel, but this is not what is happening here. The government monopoly remains intact, but now private investors are being invited to participate in this monopoly. In addition, the proceeds of the sale will go to financing other monopoly ventures of government.

Critics of this proposal are lamenting the loss of "taxpayer control," the fire sale pricing, loss of income, and exposing existing consumers to the 'greedy private sector.' Are these criticisms warranted?

Presumably taxpayers have been in control up until now because the government still holds these assets. Why then have there been so many complaints (10,000 +) regarding Hydro One? What necessitated a 15-month investigation by the Ontario Ombudsman followed by a 119-page-report called "In the Dark"? That report is extremely critical of the taxpayer-controlled Hydro One. Aside from the huge number of billing complaints, the cost of electricity for consumers keeps rising. Surely consumers, taxpayers, would find a way to exercise better control, if it existed, over pricing. Obviously there has been little control, so, little to lose.

As for "fire sale" pricing, the prices of Hydro One shares have yet to be determined. Shares will be parceled out

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over time. What is certain is that the value of Hydro One shares depends directly on government adjusting the monopoly price through the Ontario Energy Board (OEB). The OEB sets the price twice a year and that is determined largely by government policy. It is the primary reason share ownership will provide a good rate of return. How good is the return?

A recent article in the Toronto Star criticized the sale as the "biggest con job ever seen." The author uses earning statements from 2014 and goes on to say: "1) Hydro One earns \$749 million. 2) The province pays, on average, a 3.8-per-cent interest rate on its outstanding debt and 3) the province can borrow new money at rates as low as 2.1 per cent for 10 years. So here's the question: how much should we, as Ontarians, receive for selling this \$749-million income stream?

One-way to calculate it is to say that \$749 million pays all of the interest on \$20 billion in existing government debt at a rate of 3.8 per cent. So, to accept anything less than \$20 billion in cash is a bad deal." But, the government has already announced it expects only \$9 Billion for 60% of Hydro One, far, far less than the author of the above article considers fair value. No wonder the sale is attractive to private investors, given the circumstances it looks like a bad deal for Ontario.

The fact remains though; customers must still pay the uncompetitive price for electricity. Consumers now have poor service at high prices and this has happened under taxpayer control. If a competitive situation were allowed consumers might gain some benefit by escaping from the 'greedy public sector.' As for loss of income for the government, most voters won't notice that. What will be seen is that government may keep its 2014 election promise of eliminating the deficit by 2017-18.

Opponents of the sale complain that government oversight will disappear once the sale is made. It's hard to imagine it being worse than now. There are other agencies that handle consumer complaints, and the private sector owners may even be more responsive to complaints than the government controlled Hydro One. Could they be LESS responsive?

Is this sale beneficial for Ontarians? That depends on your point of view. Little will change for customers of the new owners, maybe a slight advantage in overall price. The government may shrink slightly by divesting itself of assets, which would be positive in our view. This asset sale may forestall raising taxes or borrowing more money, also a positive. By using this method of raising money for new ventures, the government is acknowledging that Ontario is in an untenable fiscal position, and that is the first step for necessary restraint. Will that happen?

I was at a Hamilton Pub Night a few months after the 2011 provincial election, chatting with a guest (i.e. not a declared libertarian). He commented that he considered voting for Anthony Giles, the Libertarian candidate in his riding, but he really liked the incumbent MPP (a PC if I recall correctly). He had been very helpful. I asked if his MPP had helped him to deal with government regulations. He thought about it for a minute and nodded his head in agreement. I think it gave him a new perspective on government. Maybe an unintended consequence of the hurdles governments create is that our representatives can appear to be helpful to their voters.

I was tempted to include this incident in my letter to the editor of The Landowner magazine, but I estimated it would have a better chance of getting published if it wasn't any longer. So here is my email sent May 29 after reading the February/March 2015 issue.

"Thanks for an excellent magazine. As a city boy my-self and former owner of a yellow lab, I particularly enjoyed Rick Andrews article about his 'Best Back-yard Chicken Dog EVER.' And as a citizen who is disturbed by the increasing government regulation and intrusions into our lives, I can relate to many stories in The Landowner about government harassment and persecution of farmers. Unfortunately, I'm not sure you appreciate the root cause of our problems. It hit me when I saw the Patrick Brown ad on the back of the Feb/March 2015 issue. Jack MacLaren is quoted as declaring, "Patrick Brown ... knows the job of government is to help people." Once you accept that government should HELP people by using force, its only tool, you are agreeing that politicians, bureaucrats and government appointees can decide what is best for you, me and the rest of us, and pass laws to tell us what we must or must not do. Your articles about the EPA (page 19) and LHINs (page 30) and others are perfect examples of this in action. Under the guise of HELPING us, government is limiting our rights and freedoms.

"Individuals, either alone or in groups, help people. Government 'helps' by forcing us as individuals to help others who may or may not be deserving of (or even need) that help. More often than not, it doesn't really help much unless it's for big business or big unions.

"The only time you or I may use force is to protect life, liberty and property. Why is it we expect government to us force for any purpose other than to protect us from those who would take our lives, freedom and property?
